

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Editor's Note: Readers will remember Scarlett, a cat probably born in 1995, whose efforts to save her kittens from a fire, at serious harm to herself, attracted worldwide media attention and has been related in a number of non-fiction books, TV shows, and magazine articles. On March 30th, 1996, Scarlett was in an abandoned garage allegedly used as a crack house in Brooklyn, New York, with her five kittens. A fire started and the New York Fire Department responded and quickly extinguished it. One of the firefighters on the scene, David Giannelli, noticed a few of the month-old kittens outside of the garage. Their mother (Scarlett) was nowhere to be found. Eventually he found her, barely clinging to life. She was severely burned in the process of pulling each kitten from the fire. Her eyes were blistered shut, her ears were severely burned, as were her paws and her fur. The hair on her face was almost completely burned away. Giannelli carefully put them in a box he had found and raced them to the veterinary clinic of the North Shore Animal League in Port Washington. The story of this feline

mother's heroic efforts to save her kittens attracted worldwide media attention, and the League received countless phone calls and 7,000 letters offering to adopt Scarlett and her kittens. Does it really take such dramatic actions for a cat to be adopted? The North Shore Animal League has created an award named "The Scarlett Award for Animal Heroism" in her honor. This award is presented to animals that have engaged in heroic acts to benefit others, whether humans or animals. We also learned that Scarlett passed away a few years ago but has been remembered several times in a Facebook celebration of her heroism. Please adopt a cat!! 



Sunday, June 9th 2013. As the summer days lengthen, the air turned mellow as did many people. I quess it affects other creatures, too. There is a white cat with calico markings I call Ginger. I have taken care of her for many years, even though she is feral and runs as soon as she sees me approach. I had a few bad weeks trying to find her; a mother cat with three kittens had taken over her usual spot under a hedge. I went to great lengths to find her, making and covering a shelter in the middle of a torrential rain storm. I am sure she was aware of my concern for her. The mother cat and kittens have disappeared temporarily, and today, Ginger was back, luxuriating in the soft summer air. When I got out of the car, she stayed in one place, with her paws tucked under her. I walked closer to her than usual before she hobbled away (Ginger is crippled but gets along quite well, thank you). I went to feed in a few other places, and Ginger had placed herself even closer where I park my car. I stepped out just to spend time with her. We sat about twenty feet away from each other, just basking in the quiet warmth. After about fifteen minutes, I began walking toward her, stopping when I noticed the reflexes in her hind legs signaling that I had come close enough. I backed away, but to acknowledge her enjoyment of the company, she bowed, in the way cats do that really means they like you. She has never done that to me before and I regard it as a sort of honor.



The Rockville Rocket: Gene Pitney By Martin McMahon

Rockville, Connecticut, about 25 miles southeast of Agawam, was home to a pop singer from the Sixties whose voice has been compared to opera singer Enrico Caruso. Gene Pitney's fabulous tenor voice startled the pop music world. His career began in the late Fifties while still a teenager. By the Sixties he was famous. Gene Pitney was not only a singer but also a composer of songs recorded by many stars. He was well known in Europe where he recorded songs in English, Italian, Spanish, and German. Like an opera singer, he had a strong, emotionally moving voice. Some songs that ranked high on the charts were "Every Breath I Take," "Town Without Pity," "The Man Who Shot Liberty Valance," "Only Love Can Break a Heart," "Half Heaven, Half Heartache," "Twenty-Four Hours From Tulsa," "It Hurts to be in Love," and "She's a Heartbreaker." Other songs placed high on the pop music charts in Europe. The hit songs he wrote for other performers included Bobby Vee's "Rubber Ball," Ricky Nelson's "Hello Mary Lou," and The Crystals' "He's a Rebel." Not only was Gene Pitney a composer, but he also played several instruments. In his early years at Rockville High, he had his own band, "Gene and the Genials." His nickname, "The Rockville Rocket," stayed with him all through life. Stardom came at an early age when he wrote and performed the title song of the film "Town Without Pity." Gene sang it at the Academy Awards, nationally televised. Next, he became famous for singing a Burt Bacharach song, "The Man Who Shot Liberty Valance," inspired by a John Wayne movie of the same name. In his career, Gene Pitney has performed at Carnegie Hall and has been inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame. He never retired but passed away of heart disease in his early sixties while performing to standing ovations in England. He was married and had three sons. A plaque commemorating his achievements can be found at Rockville Town Hall. Each year Rockville High School awards a Gene Pitney music scholarship in honor of "The Rockville Rocket."

The plaintiff alleged that she slipped and fell at her condominium due to a slippery floor. She claimed that the defendant cleaning company left the floor wet and failed to provide any warning of the dangerous conditions. The defendant claimed that it had not yet arrived at the plaintiff's quad until after she had fallen. The company said that even if it had washed the floor that day, the process that is used always left floors dry. The plaintiff alleged that the fall caused three herniated lumbar discs requiring two surgical procedures. The plaintiff's expert opined that the fall was the proximate cause of the treatment. The defendant's orthopedic expert argued that the plaintiff's condition pre-dated the accident and that the fall did not change her condition in any significant fashion. He opined that none of the plaintiff's treatment was causally related to the slip and fall. The plaintiff was found 25% comparatively at fault.

Plaintiff's settlement: \$550,000.00

Unusual Novel, Unexpected Author

Still Water is a novel by William F. Weld, Governor of Massachusetts from 1991 to 1997. He also wrote Mackerel by Moonlight and Big Ugly. Still Water is about the five towns in Western Massachusetts that were flooded to create the huge reservoir, the Quabbin. But this book, unexpectedly enjoyable, is an imagined narrative by one of the young people who lives in one of the five doomed towns. Jamieson, the narrator,

falls in love with Hannah, his dream girl from a nearby farm, who enriches his senses of what is being lost by recalling lives lived. In the Valley during the French and Indian war, the insurrection of Daniel Shays and the War Between the States became a theme in this Valley. "When I was fifteen years old, I fell in love for the first and hardest time, I had my first tastes of inhumanity, and I watched every person I knew lose everything...In a brief time, I had the good fortune to see it all: the life that was lived in the five towns when we thought it would go on forever, the rumor of the plan to flood the valley, the foreboding that grew like a fog around us, and the aftermath. I could have lived ten lives and I would not have learned so much about endings and beginnings. They say in a country town, a man who dies today is buried in the earth where he's lain many times before; the man who marries today takes the same wife he's taken for generations. Perhaps that made the powerful folks in Boston feel it didn't matter if they buried our homes."

The reader learn details about the girls who worked at the hat factory in Dana, who were given a free palm leaf hat for summer every year...and about those who would stop at the soda fountain to say hello to the boys who could occasionally afford to buy a white cow (vanilla iced cream and ginger ale). The reader experiences the feelings of the people, who saw that once word got out about the talk about putting the towns under water, people would not settle in the valley... The reader finds that children played Daniel Shays and General Benjamin Lincoln the way other boys played cowboys and Indians. Shays, a decorated officer of the American Revolution, had led the farmers' insurgency against the new government of the United States in 1787.

"Our town had need of Captain Shays a century and a half later. That was when the Governor of Massachusetts announced a plan to send more men west from Boston, this time to flood the Valley to create a reservoir sixteen miles long, better to assuage the thirst of the patriotic citizens of Boston.

"Before they crossed the locks at Winsor Dam, I could have led you to every cave, tunnel, quarry, and mine shaft in the Valley."
