That's because eleven inches of snow and six days without electricity caused the event to be canceled, or (more accurately), rescheduled to Saturday, January 21, 2012. Tickets from the fall event will be honored in January. Located at 663 Main Street in the Agawam Center Historic District, the Captain Leonard House will offer a piping hot lunch of Chicken a la King at two servings: 11:30 am and 1:00 pm. Salad, side, and a homebaked seasonal dessert will accompany the entree. Members of the all-volunteer board of trustees will serve the luncheon and a donation of \$10 per meal is suggested. Reservations are encouraged - seating is limited at the 11:30 seating, but available at the 1:00 seating. Please call 413-786-9421 for more information. A much-anticipated fine linen, crystal, silver & collectibles sale, coordinated by Captain Leonard House trustee Alice Smith, returns as part of the luncheon and promises many great items at affordable prices. The sale runs from 10:00 am through 3:00 pm in the front parlors and main hallway at the House. Proceeds from the luncheon and sale will aid in the preservation of the 200 year-old Captain Charles Leonard House, which serves as Agawam's Community House and is available to rent for business and social events. The Captain Leonard House was built in 1805 as a stage tavern to service travelers on the Hartford/Boston route. It has served as Agawam's Community House since 1939, when Mrs. Minerva Davis restored the property and created the non-profit organization that operates the house. The house was placed on the National Register of Historic Places in 1975, and occupies a prominent location in the Agawam Center National Register Historic District. The Captain Leonard House is considered to be Agawam's finest Federal-era home. The House is available to rent for business functions and social events. 

### Adventures among the winter stars

(Agawam, Mass.) The Agawam Cultural Council's popular Applause Series turns its focus skyward on Friday, February 10, 2012 at 7:30 PM at the Agawam Public Library when Richard Sanderson will take guests on a cosmic adventure through the winter skies, when stars and constellations like Orion and Taurus sparkle. Sanderson, curator of physical science at the Springfield Science Museum and director of the Seymour Planetarium, the oldest operating planetarium in the United States, will use breathtaking photos to illustrate the wonders of the winter sky. Tracing winter constellations and zooming in on celestial objects, including the giant planet Jupiter, Sanderson will describe how stars are born, how they die, and explore the possibility of finding life on other worlds. He also will discuss the upcoming transit of Venus across the sun, a very rare event that will not be seen again for more than a century. Sanderson is past president of the Springfield Stars Club and co-founder of the Connecticut River Valley Astronomers' Conjunction, an annual astronomy convention. He has written numerous articles on astronomy and is co-author of the 2006 book Illustrated Timeline of the Universe. ### FIRST PERSON HISTORIC PRESENTATIONAT STORROWTON VILLAGE MUSEUM

Eastern States Exposition's Storrowton Village Museum will present its annual First Person Presentation, "Augustus Hazard, the Hazard Powder Company, and the Hazardville Gunpowder Industry," Friday, January 20, at 7 p.m., in its historic Meetinghouse.

Historian Elliot Levy, of Longmeadow, Mass., will appear in costume as Colonel Augustus Hazard, the man behind Enfield's gunpowder manufacturing complex. Col. Hazard's decision to ship gunpowder to the South on the eve of the Civil War led to questions of his loyalty to the Union. Levy is the Executive Director of Career Services at Branford Hall Career Institute and a 16-year Civil War re-enactor. He also portrays Captain John Bigelow of the 9th Mass. Light Artillery and Civil War hero Lt. Howard Burnham of Longmeadow, Mass. The 45-minute presentation will be followed by a question and answer period. 
